## **Divisional notes:**

# Swell

- this becomes increasingly unreliable the closer we get to the next tuning; it is often best to couple through to the choir and play there.
- the oboe sticks occasionally -just listen out, push the stop in and draw again
- the trumpet has been taken out of use -this is a nuisance. The 16' reed is really too heavy on its own, so either use the Sw/Gt Octave coupler, or couple the Cor Harmonique through, with the choir box slightly closed

#### Great

- Generally a good idea to couple the 8' foundations from the choir through for hymn accompaniment (and the 16' if you have a large congregation) as the Open Diap 2 doesn't really give enough weight
- The Tromba and Clarion are very effective still they do not blend particularly well as much of the Great is not there to balance it out. Experiment!

## Pedal

- The 16' bourdon is all that is needed for quieter passages, but couple through from the choir if possible to give a bit more coverage. The other 16s are quite large.
- Use the 32' reed sparingly -it's a banger, but is very loud particularly with the problems on the Great.

# Choir

Generally reliable and a useful resource. Check the reed for tuning and run a quick scale to check all the notes are working if you are soloing it out. It is not as helpful to the choristers as was intended, as the choir stalls are further West than when the organ was installed.
