


Welcome

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


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

Location



We are located at the very heart of High Wycombe which has excellent bus and rail links. High Wycombe also operates a park and ride service from the M40 Junction 4.

We unfortunately only have limited disabled parking at the church although there is additional disabled parking and 'pay and display' parking outside the church on Priory Road.

Within 5 minutes walking of the church is the Swan Car Park which is off St Mary Street and the Easton Street Car Park. Alternatively there are two train station car parks and the Eden Centre Car Park which is approximately 8-10 minutes walk away.

Note: Should you seek to hold your reception at the Museum there is a footbridge over the railway meaning it is a 5 minute walk from the church to your reception venue.

...one or both of us are not christened/baptised?


You can have a church wedding whether you are christened/baptised or not.

History

Did you know that All Saints Church is over 900 year old. The exact date the church was built is unknown but research shows it was around 1087. It is the oldest building still standing in the town and is therefore the historical heart of High Wycombe.

Imagine all the couples over all that time who have lived, worshipped and married in this church. When you get married in this church you become part of that continuous history of the community.



Personal

You will be involved in making choices about your ceremony. You can choose the music, readings and prayers. You also have options as to the words of the service. Whether you prefer the service in contemporary language or more traditional language which has words such as 'thee' and 'thou' instead of 'you'.




Music

Music is a key part of a wedding service. Hymns in particular are a traditional part of church weddings and there are many to choose from. Visit the website at the bottom of the page to hear samples of popular choices.

You may want traditional hymns, organ music, a choir, something more contemporary or classical. You can use pre-recorded music, the musicians available at the church or you could bring in your own musicians. The choice is yours.

(All music whether live or recorded has a fee payable)





Readings

You choose the bible reading for the service and this is one of the ways a wedding can be made really personal. Popular Bible passages can be found on the website at the bottom of the page, but we can help with choosing alternatives if you'd like something different..

You can also customise your wedding further by adding things such as poetry readings to the service. If you wanted to do this then tell us what you would like and we can talk this through with you further.

Prayers

Your service will certainly include prayers. We will be very happy to help you develop some prayers that have special and personal meaning for you. It is possible for one of your guests to read prayers during the service and if this is something you would like to happen at your wedding, talk to us about how it could be incorporated.

When supporting you in something as important as marriage, the church will pray for you before, during and after your wedding.



Flowers

You can choose how many flowers you would like and where. Do contact us, or ask your florist to contact us, about any ideas you have regarding flower arrangements for your wedding. We are open to all kinds of ideas on what you would like to achieve, whether modest, extravagant or anything in-between.

We are able to arrange a modest display of flowers for a fee in the church using our own team. If this is something you would like then contact the office and someone from our team will discuss your requirements.

Countdown to your wedding

Whether you plan to get married in a couple of years or in just a few months, we will help you through the process of booking and planning the ceremony. The following timings follow a typical pattern and may serve as a general guide.

One-two years ahead

It's often about 18 – 24 months ahead when couples start planning. The first step is usually booking the reception venue, but make sure you talk to us as well to agree the date so that everything fits together. We will make arrangements for you to meet with us so that we can get to know you a little and complete the necessary forms.



Now is the time to ask whether you will require a licence to get married. Most people will not – we will advise if this applies to you at your first meeting. We will also explain to you about having to get your banns read, especially if that will be in more than one church.

One year-six months ahead

During the next few months, you will probably pop in to your reception venue a few times. In a similar way, visit us and discover more about what happens here. If you are creating a connection to the church by attending for six months, this is the time to go along regularly each month. You may not hear from us until about six to nine months before the wedding – especially if you have booked a long time ahead. But don't worry, we will be in touch. This is also the time to consider your ceremony and making some of the choices as already mentioned in this booklet.

We will offer you the time and space to think about what marriage entails, the meaning of the marriage vows and understanding the service. This we hope will prepare you for married life. It is not compulsory, but if you do choose to take this up, we will usually arrange to meet with you within the six months preceding the wedding.

Around six months ahead of the wedding might also be a good time to book your flower arranger and bell-ringers if you are having them. We may also contact you during this time to remind you of the dates your banns will be read.



Three months ahead

The majority of marriages require that banns are read out in church for three Sundays during the three months before the wedding. Many couples like to be in the church when their banns are read. The congregation will be praying for you and your marriage, and this can be a reassuring and special experience. It also helps you get to know us if you are unfamiliar with us.

You might like to review how your ceremony is shaping up and make any final decisions with us at around this time. Also check with photographers that they are aware of our guidelines on photographs. See if you can visit the church together with the photographer and introduce them to us. Coordinating your other wedding suppliers with our team will help things run as smoothly as possible.

One-two weeks ahead

We will hold a rehearsal for the wedding, which will usually be during the week before the wedding. This will help you relax and ask any final questions about where to stand and so on. It's ideal if everyone who has a part to play on the day comes along, as it all helps to make the day run smoothly.

The day before

This can be a nerve-wracking time for both bride and groom, so finding time to relax in the evening may help you sleep better. You may find it helpful to light a candle and say the following prayer:

This day has been so long coming,
so long planned,
so long anticipated,
Help us relax enough to enjoy it.
Help us to concentrate enough to appreciate it.
Be with those who have a special part to play
and with everyone as they travel to join us.
May this day be all we have hoped for.
May it be a wonderful start to the rest of our lives.
Amen.

The Big Day

When the day finally arrives all that remains is for you to enjoy each moment! Ushers may want to arrive about 45 minutes early to check Orders of Service are in place, or ready to give out as people arrive.

The groom and best man arrive before the bride too. Everyone (except the bride, her father or the person walking her down the aisle, bridesmaids and/or page boy if you have them), should be seated and ready about 10-15 minutes before the service is due to start. The priest may have a couple of brief notices to read at this point.

When you walk into your beautiful church to make this great commitment, know that God's love and our prayers are with you. Relax and enjoy your day!

Order of Service

A ceremony typically usually lasts between 30-45 minutes depending on whether you have any music and the choice of readings. We will talk through with you the order of service and the options you have to personalise your wedding. Arriving at the church

When the bride arrives she will have time before you enter the church. The bride may walk down the aisle alone or accompanied. When arriving at the front of the church the bride and groom stand side by side

Welcome

The priest will begin with a few words of welcome to all present. A hymn can be sung or some music played at this point. After which the priest will introduce and begin the service.

Declaration and vows

The priest will ask everyone if they have any legal objection to the wedding proceeding. There may be a reading or the priest will proceed with the vows.

Exchange of rings and blessing

The best man typically passes the rings to the priest so they can be blessed and then exchanged by the bride and groom. After this the priest will proclaim the bride and groom husband and wife.

Readings

There will always be a bible reading and a talk by the priest. This may or may not be accompanied by other readings as you choose.

Signing the register

The register will be signed by the bride, groom, priest and two witnesses. It only takes a few minutes. Typically some form of music is played at this time.

End of the service

After the register is signed the priest, bride and groom head to the altar where the priest will bless the couple.

Leaving the church

The newly married couple leave followed by the best man, bridesmaids and parents. Outside there will be photographs and confetti!

Some legal issues

In marriage you take on a whole new legal status. We will advise and prepare you for your wedding day and everything must comply with all UK and Church of England laws covering issues such as...

...Banns or licence

Most Church of England marriages will require banns to be published before the wedding can take place. There are some circumstances though in which you may need a Special Licence, Common Licence or a Superintendent Registrar's Certificate to marry in church. We will let you know if these apply to you.

...Time of wedding

The wedding must take place between 8am and 6pm on any day.

... Marrying away from where you live

It's possible to get married in our church if you live outside the parish providing you have a certain kind of connection with us. You may be legally connected to a number of churches in different ways. We will talk you through this if required.

...Guidelines for divorcees

There are special guidelines on marriage in the church if you are divorced. There may well be a way forward, but you will need to talk to us about your situation and there will be a need to explore the possibilities for you of you getting married in the church with the priest.
